ecalling our milestones over the past two years, we are simply amazed by how much Farm & Wilderness has accomplished – all a fitting prelude to our 75th Anniversary celebration in 2014.

We had full enrollment in both 2012 and 2013, with over 800 campers attending both summers. We were named a "Best Places to Work in Vermont" for the first time in 2012 and repeated the feat in 2013. We celebrated with alumni, camper families and friends at F&W community dinners in Tarrytown, NY, and Philadelphia; held our Nationwide Potluck in nearly 20 cities across the country; and hosted many House Parties, Community Dances, cider and pancake gatherings. We welcomed alumni from Indian Brook, Saltash Mountain, and Tamarack Farm for their camp reunions.

As if that didn't keep us busy, we launched a pilot Girls' Wilderness Program, transformed our website, reinvigorated our Counselor in Training program, welcomed alpacas to the Farm, built four new cabins, and produced over 6,000 pounds of organic produce and hundreds of gallons of milk.

As an organization, we celebrated 40 years as a nonprofit foundation, a historic milestone made possible only by building on the mission and values of our founders. We honor Ken and Susan Webb, as well as the caring and kindness of hundreds of staffers and three generations of camp families who have joined us on this journey. Looking towards our future, we launched the "Thrive for 75 Strategic Plan" to ensure that F&W's mission, programs and values will be strong for the next three generations of campers.

Our annual reports are a mirror on the past - giving us a chance to reflect on how we've met our challenges and see what we've accomplished over the past months. We're eager to create new opportunities for F&W to thrive for the next 75 years.



Financial Report

uring the fiscal years of 2012 and 2013 covered by this annual report, we've enjoyed several milestones and seen our financial position continue to strengthen.

F&W's financial performance in 2012 was notable in a number of respects: Contributions from our generous donors were \$200,000 more than in 2011; Killington/Pico Ski Resort Partners LLC agreed to a 25-year extension of our agreement to lease the rights to the water from Woodward Reservoir for winter snowmaking; and we ended the year with no debt – certainly a first in a great number of years.

The financial results of our core operations were solid in 2012, although the results lagged somewhat behind those of 2011. Net tuition revenue declined modestly

in 2012 largely because our enrollment fell just shy of budgeted expectations and we awarded more camperships than in prior years. Other revenue generators, including special events and farm sales, returned to expected levels after dipping the prior year due to impacts from Tropical Storm Irene. In 2013, thanks to strong enrollment, our net tuition revenue grew again as did campership awards. On the other hand, contributions were down to just below historical averages.

We also saw our expenses rise in 2012 and 2013 – particularly our programmatic expenses. Food costs, repairs, and salaries all grew as we focused on strengthening our programs and facilities and keeping up with strong enrollment. To ensure our long-term sustainability, we will continue to work to minimize growth in our operating expenses.

About four years ago, our Board of Trustees made a plan to fully pay down our debt within a decade. We're fortunate to have erased that debt by the end of 2012, ahead of schedule. This is due to our vibrant operations, careful use of cash, strong early enrollment in 2013, the Killington agreement, and the 2011 sale of a conservation easement on Lake Ninevah. In 2013, we used some of that available credit to invest in our sustainability project at Tamarack Farm – a carbon reduction project where we will recapture the outlay with savings on fuel bills in about 15 years. Investments such as this one left us with a modest cash deficit at the end of 2013.

Our invested funds continued to perform well in 2012 and 2013. At the end of 2011, F&W's endowment funds totaled about \$4 million. By the end of 2013, thanks to generous contributions and a strong market, the balance grew to almost \$4.5 million. These long-term investments will help us continue expanding our important campership program.








Program & Enrollment Snapshot

T n 2012, 589 campers attended one of our overnight camps and 202 attended Barn Day Camp. In 2013, we reached 100% enrollment with 627 campers attending one of our overnight camps and 234 attending the Barn Day Camp.

In both years we welcomed campers from diverse backgrounds and ethnicities: 22 percent of overnight campers identified themselves as African American, Multiracial, Asian American, Latino/a, Native American, or as foreign citizens.




2012/2013 Program Highlights: Our Program Team worked hard to inspire, plan and lead values-based programming for campers. The camps sent out more than 100 overnight hiking, canoeing, rock climbing, outdoor living skills and service based trips each year. From waterfront activities to circus arts to work projects, campers learned valuable skills. built community and contributed to meaningful service.

Campership: Campership is integral to how Farm & Wilderness achieves its mission. In 2012, 24% of campers received campership assistance totaling \$536,000. In 2013, 25% of campers received campership totaling nearly \$550,000. The average award was between \$1,000 and \$2,500. These awards for financial assistance are supported 100% through charitable contributions from the F&W community.

Camper Geography at a Glance

In 2012, campers arrived from 31 states and five foreign countries. In 2013, campers came from 28 states and seven foreign countries.



Sustainability Report

In alignment with our mission and value of simplicity, Farm & Wilderness has worked to better understand and reduce our impact on the planet. In 2009, we began measuring our greenhouse gas output under the leadership of Dano Weisbord, F&W alumni and former Timberlake director, and most recently with the assistance of Elisabeth Wolfe, Sustainability Consultant.

F&W has now completed greenhouse gas inventories every year since 2009. Analyzing resource use over five years has been vital in understanding how our practices affect global climate change, and has helped us to prioritize the most practical methods to address them. With the aid of this annual inventory, we were able to see that our "low hanging fruit" reduces our fossil fuel use for heating and hot water. This information prompted us to design and install a wood boiler system for heat and hot water for the lodge,

showers and greenhouses at Tamarack Farm. Once fully online, we expect to eliminate the purchase and use of about 5,000 gallons of fossil fuels annually.

Greenhouse Gas Inventory Results

F&W greenhouse gas emissions are divided into seven operational categories:

- 1. Buildings includes emissions from electricity, hot water, heat, refrigeration and cooking fuel.
- 2. Vehicles includes emissions from cars, trucks and vans owned by F&W.
- 3. Agriculture includes emissions from farm animals.
- 4. Commuting includes travel by year-round staff between office and home.
- 5. Air Travel includes work-related travel by year-round staff.
- 6. Outsourced Transportation includes work-related personal vehicle trips by year-round staff.



7. Office Paper includes the use of paper by F&W staff.

In 2013, F&W operations were responsible for the emissions of 357 metric tons of equivalent carbon dioxide (MTeCO₂). (see Greenhouse Gas Emissions 2013 chart for more detail)

F&W' aerobic composting program (turning compost regularly and monitoring the temperature) reduces the amount of greenhouse gases that would otherwise be released if those materials decomposed without intervention. Composting at F&W resulted in the avoidance of 29 MTeCO₂ or over 8% of F&W's 2013 greenhouse gas emissions.

Trends

Net emissions have declined steadily, by 5%, over the last four years of the inventory, even as the number of staff and campers have increased. The chart of total emissions from years 2009-2013 (at right) displays this trend. The dark green shows total emissions,


the light green shows net emissions after subtracting avoided emissions associated with composting.


The results show emissions increasing from 2009 to 2010 and then falling slowly since then. The increase from 2009 to 2010 is attributed to improvements in the quality of data collected between the first and second years of the inventory.

Notable Results, Trends and the Path Forward


While overall there has been a steady decline in total emissions, looking at F&W's operational categories separately helps make clear which areas have had the most meaningful impact on the decline in our greenhouse gas emissions, as well as which operational categories could most benefit from institutional change and improvement. The chart below shows changes in emissions over time, separated out by operational category.

We anticipate a significant decline in emissions in 2014 when our wood





boiler system will become operational at Tamarack Farm. In the next several years, we will design a zero-emissions building for our main office; increase the use of electric vehicles and bicycles during the summer season; continue to replace inefficient appliances; and explore the installation of photovoltaic systems as they become more cost effective.



Giving 2012-2013: A Snapshot

hanks to the strength and vitality of the Farm & Wilderness community we enjoyed many opportunities to celebrate and live our values, to increase the number of young people who benefit from our summer programs and share our gratitude for the generosity of F&W alumni, camper families, staff, volunteers and friends.

The F&W community generously supported the annual fund, annual campership, the endowment, staff training, sustainability and other projects with gifts in 2012 and 2013 together totaling nearly \$1 million. Thanks to this important support, we were able to provide more than \$935,000 in need-based camperships to more than 340 campers over the two years, representing 23% of 2012 and 25% of 2013 enrollment, and our endowment grew to nearly \$4.5 million by December 31, 2013.





A Life Saved by F&W's Community: Polly Williams

ver the decades, thousands of Farm & Wilderness campers have attested that their time in Vermont changed their lives. But for Polly Williams, "Farm & Wilderness saved my life." Her story is unique, yet in some ways universal.

Polly grew up in Sopchoppy, Fla., just outside Tallahassee. Her parents were professors and researchers in education who adopted her and two other children of color. "I think we were the first legal transracial adoptions in Florida," she said. The couple also had two other children, and all five would eventually attend F&W camps.

Polly's first contact with F&W was as a babysitter for a staff member. Although initially intimidated by what seemed like the crush of campers at Indian Brook while visiting, she quickly fell in love with it during her first summer as a campership camper in 1981.

"My parents were raising us in a one-room church with an outhouse in the middle of Apalachicola National Forest." So, the primitive conditions in Vermont "were not that shocking to me."

At camp, she said, "I loved being outdoors. I got to do everything the boys did at their camp: build stuff, use power tools, go canoeing. I had been to a YMCA camp where there was no canoeing for the girls. At Indian Brook, there was no gender stereotype."

F&W was a refuge for her. During her early childhood, "there was still a lot of racism in that part of Florida. Camp was a place where people talked about race. Everybody was friends."

Back home, Polly was struggling with depression. Camp became "my utopia.



Without that to look forward to, I don't think I'd be alive." Having that stabilizing and accepting influence in her life helped her later "recognize that to be a lesbian was OK."

By 1986, she was a cabin counselor and over the ensuing years became work project head, assistant director and, later, director of Indian Brook. She is now assistant director at the Barn Day Camp and her two children are F&W campers. When she's not at camp she teaches physical education and is a 7th grade teacher in Cambridge, MA.

Polly has also been an active member of the F&W Anti-Racism Team and helped bring race issues to the Board of Trustees. "Today," she said, "we have a great board in place, dedicated to asking the tough questions and working through them. It's really made a difference."

That's one of the reasons she is an annual donor and has designated a bequest for the camps in her will. "I believe in the place, what it did for me, what it does for kids. I know about F&W's commitment to try anti-racism work and to recruit kids and staff of color. Social justice is part of my life. It is a lot of who I am, and I like giving to an organization that really believes in that."

As one of the 2012 Circle of Light honorees recognized for her service to F&W, "it was a huge honor to be named at the same time as Jack and Ruth Hunter," who were among the surrogate parents Polly found at camp.

Her award returns the love she has shown for F&W. It reads, "you say that Farm & Wilderness saved your life, but it is you who have saved us, at many times, in many ways, by acting as our conscience."

Ruth and Jack Hunter Recognized at Saltash Mountain's 50th

Jack Hunter have embodied the Farm & Wilderness spirit. Since serving as cofounding directors of Saltash Mountain Camp (SAM) a half century ago, the Hunters have given their talents, time and love to F&W. In 2012, on the 50th anniversary of the opening of SAM, they each received a Circle of Light Award for their ongoing service to the F&W community.

As co-directors of SAM beginning in 1962 and later at Tamarack Farm, the Hunters helped guide the activities and shape the lives of scores of campers, including their own children. In 1973, lack became executive director of F&W Foundation.

Their first summer at SAM was 1961, when they oversaw the building of cabins and other facilities for the campers who were to arrive the next year for an intensive hiking and outdoors experience.

"It was really primitive," Ruth recalled. "There was no electricity, it was two miles in either direction from a paved road and there was no house up there. I was a little uneasy."

Jack, on the other hand, had the outdoors and camping in his blood. "I started as a kid, camping with Boy Scouts. My first job out of high school was working at a Boy Scout summer camp in Pennsylvania."

He had been directing a camp in Cape Cod just before he met F&W founder Ken Webb. "We talked for a couple of hours. He was interested in my background; I knew and admired his camps." By the end of the conversation, Ken asked Jack to be part of the launch of a new camp he had in mind. It became Saltash Mountain Camp.

At F&W, both Jack and Ruth were drawn to the Quaker values on which the



camps were founded, and became involved in the Society of Friends. "We were so impressed with the experience of Silent Meeting at F&W that Quaker meeting eventually became our spiritual home."

The Hunters left F&W in 1977, but during their years elsewhere, the Hunters stayed connected. Their children, David, Emily and twins, Amy and Edward, all attended camps each summer and some went on to become staff. Now retired in Woodstock, VT, Jack and Ruth remain close to F&W. Today, Jack is F&W's volunteer archivist.

"Ken Webb used to talk of the 'bittersweet taste' of work. It's very healthy to be involved in raising food, washing dishes for your fellow campers, making sure there is wood for the campfires. It's not just about living in nature, but being comfortable in the natural world," Jack said.

They credit the camps as defining influences for their family. "For our children, it really was a life-changing experience that determined a great deal of their continuing interests and friendships." Now the Hunters have a third generation involved in F&W. "Our two oldest grandchildren were on the staff of Barn Day Camp in 2013," said Ruth, while their youngest grandchild was a camper.

The Hunters look back with delight on their time at the camps. Ruth was particularly happy to see Saltash Mountain become mixed gender since its founding. "I think it's marvelous. It has remained small so a camper doesn't get lost there. It's like a cozy family."
